Altman Siegel is pleased to present the work of Adaline Kent (1900-1957), Ruth Laskey (b. 1975) and Ruth Asawa (1926-2013) for The Art Show. The intergenerational presentation showcases San Francisco Bay Area women artists whose practices demonstrate a deep commitment to exploring form, gesture and process.

Adaline Kent's sculptures and drawings were inspired by her time hiking in the High Sierras. Kent's vast body of work captures elemental movements through biomorphic shapes and forms. Kent is a pioneer of the mid-century modernist aesthetic. Her work includes a diverse range of imagery from infinity symbols to mountains, streams and trees.

Ruth Laskey's recent weavings highlight her continued investigation of movement through thread and loom. Laskey implements incremental angles into her twill work to create the illusion of fluid, curving lines within gridded patterns. Dedicated to tactile construction, Laskey utilizes both twill and plain weave patterns to create subtle spacial movements and color gradients.

Adaline Kent

Born 1900, San Rafael, CA Died 1957, Marin County, CA

Adaline Kent lived and worked in the Bay Area until her passing in 1957. Over the course of her lifetime, she became known as a pioneer of the midcentury modernist aesthetic, creating abstract sculptures inspired by her time spent in the mountains of the High Sierras, and by the way bodies, including her own, moved through space. Interested in exploring the experience of time in her practice, Kent's work captures elegant, elemental movements through biomorphic shapes and forms. Evoking a diverse array of imagery ranging from infinity symbols to mountains, streams, and ski slopes, the artist's dedication to creating visual movement and balance through static form transcends time, remaining as deeply resonant today as it was during her lifetime.

Kent's work has been the subject of solo exhibitions at Nevada Museum of Art, Reno, NV; Betty Parsons Gallery, New York, NY; San Francisco Museum of Modern Art, San Francisco, CA; California Palace of the Legion of Honor, San Francisco, CA; and Santa Barbara Museum of Art, Santa Barbara, CA. 
Ruth LaskeyBorn 1975, San Luis Obispo, CA
Lives and works in San Francisco, CA

Ruth Laskey lives and works in San Francisco, CA. Working within the textile tradition, her minimalist, abstract weavings are characterized by precise, geometric forms which explore color, shape, and the fundamentals of image making. Dedicated to tactile construction, Laskey utilizes both twill and plain weave patterns to create subtle spacial movements, color gradients, and dynamic lines which revel in the details left by the artist's hand. Building her imagery into its own support by hand-dying her thread prior to weaving, Laskey subverts the ubiquitous dualism of figure and ground as a means to explore the limits of a textile-based practice.

Laskey's work has been the subject of solo exhibitions at Huxley-Parlour, London, UK; Ratio 3, San Francisco, CA; Adrian Rosenfeld Gallery, San Francisco, CA; CAPITAL, San Francisco, CA; Galerie Cinzia Friedlaender, Berlin, Germany; and Song Song, Vienna, Austria. Group exhibitions include Cample Line, Scotland; James Cohan, New York, NY; Columbus College of Art and Design, Columbus, OH; Contemporary Arts Museum, Houston, TX; Institute of Contemporary Art, Boston, MA; Berkeley Art Museum and Pacific Film Archive, Berkeley, CA; Stephen Friedman Gallery, London, UK; David Zwirner, New York, NY; San Francisco Museum of Modern Art, San Francisco, CA; Galerie Ute Parduhn, Dusseldorf, Germany; The Approach, London, UK; and Misako & Rosen, Tokyo, Japan.


