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EVER BALDWIN

Ever Baldwin (b. 1978, Brookline MA) lives and works in the Hudson Valley in upstate New York. Baldwin's semi-abstract paintings contain sensuous forms that refer to the body, spirituality and the tensions between our inner and outer worlds. Bordered by blackened hand carved wooden frames, the artist's sumptuous highcontrast compositions are both timeless and enigmatic.

Baldwin received his BFA from the Maryland Institute College of Art (MICA) in 2000 and his MFA from The School of The Museum of Fine Arts/Tufts University in 2005. In July 2023, Baldwin opened his first museum solo exhibition at the Ogunquit Museum of American Art, Ogunquit Maine, with an accompanying catalogue. Other solo presentations include LeFebvre et Fils, Paris France (2022); Marinaro, NYC (2022); and Five Car Garage/Emma Gray HQ, Los Angeles CA (2022). Baldwin's work has been featured in group exhibitions at Modern Art, London UK (2022); Hudson House, NYC (2022; 2021); Left Field Gallery, Los Osos CA (2020); and Opalka Gallery, Albany NY (2020). He was a 2021 recipient of the NYFA/NYSCA Fellowship in Painting.








TONY FEHER




