b. 1986, Seoul, South Korea Lives and works in Brooklyn, NY


Marked by a keen use of color and sumptuous impasto, Choi's work features chimerical landscapes often populated with genderless or supergendered anthropomorphic figures. Boldly sensuous subjects interact in their otherworldly surroundings with a sense of agency and playful irreverence toward social confines. Blurring the lines that define identity, Choi's works draw the viewer into her indulgent fantasies, subtly invoking critical portrayals surrounding body image, otherness, and sexuality.

Hyegyeong Choi received a BFA from Chung Ang University, Seoul, and an MFA from the Art Institute of Chicago. Choi's work has been the subject of solo presentations at NADA Miami, Harper's (2023); Carl Kostyál, London (2023); Harper's, Los Angeles (2022); Shelter Gallery, New York (2021); Slow Gallery, Chicago (2020); and Stolbun Collection, New York and Chicago (2018 and 2015). Most recently, she has participated in group exhibitions at Harper's, New York, Los Angeles, and East Hampton (2023 and 2021); Pond Society, Shanghai (2023); Micki Meng/Parker Gallery, New York (2023); National Arts Club, New York (2023); Deitch Gallery, Los Angeles (2022); Carl Kostyál, Milan (2022); Christie's, New York (2022); Another Gallery, Paris (2022); CHART, New York (2021); and Anton Kern, New York (2021). Reviews of her work have appeared in *Artforum*, *New York Times*, and *Hyperallergic*, among other publications.


Sung Hwa Kim











Iria Leino

b. 1932, Helsinki, Finland

d. 2022, New York, NY

Iria Leino graduated from the Helsinki Academy of Fine Arts in 1955, but moved to Paris to pursue a career as a fashion model instead of painting. She became one of the first supermodels known solely by a single name, "IRIA," walked the runways of Europe, and frequently appeared in magazines such as Vogue and Harper's Bazaar. After years of defining a new era of Parisian stardom, however, she began to feel objectified and reduced to a symbol of female sexuality. In an abrupt change of direction, Iria left the high life behind and escaped to New York in 1964. She settled into a 4,000-square-foot loft in SoHo, where she fully immersed herself in her original pursuit as an artist and embraced a new spiritual life grounded in Buddhism.

From 1965 to 1968, Iria studied at the Art Students League under the tutelage of Sydney Gross and Larry Poons, quickly developing an extensive body of abstract canvases. As she delved into Abstract Expressionism and the Color Field movement, her artistic process always returned to a Buddhist mindset. Iria's unwavering commitment to painting as a form of meditation led her to completely eschew the desire to exhibit in the gallery system. For her, the act of creating art was an exercise in personal and spiritual growth. Due to Iria's reclusive nature, nearly all her paintings have remained secluded within the walls of her SoHo loft. This marks the first time that her life's work is being presented to a public audience.

Spencer Lewis

b. 1979, Hartford, CT Lives and works in Los Angeles, CA

Spencer Lewis is renowned for his dynamic jute paintings characterized by dense layers of oil, acrylic, enamel, and ink, vigorously applied with raw physicality. Beyond painting, Lewis also ventures into bronzes and assemblage, but his central theme revolves around the exploration of space. His artworks serve as vivid windows, showcasing the interplay of marks and arching lines that reveal billowing bursts of rich color, expanding the pictorial field. Lewis's painterly interventions, consisting of slashes, streaks, and smears, are executed with visceral force, constantly balancing between spontaneity and control. Drawing inspiration from action painting and the Gutai movement, his compositions are emotionally charged, exuding a frenetic energy that resonates with contemporary sensibilities and challenges the conventions of traditional painting.

Lewis's work has been the subject of numerous solo presentations including Harper's, New York and East Hampton (2022, 2021, 2020, 2019, and 2017); Massimo De Carlo, Milan and Hong Kong (2023 and 2022); Gallerie Nächst, Vienna, Austria (2022); Josh Lilley, London (2022); Vito Schnabel Gallery, New York and St. Moritz (2022 and 2021); Sorry We're Closed, Brussels (2021); CANADA, New York (2021); and Van Doren Waxter, New York (2021). Most recently, he has participated in group exhibitions at Vito Schnabel, Gallery, New York (2023), WOAW Gallery, Hong Kong (2023), Massimo De Carlo, Art Basel (2023), Green Family Foundation, Dallas (2022); Massimo De Carlo, Milan (2022); Harper's, Los Angeles and East Hampton (2022, 2021, 2020, and 2018); and The Mass, Tokyo (2021). His work has been acquired by the Crystal Bridges Museum of American Art in Bentonville, AK and the National Museum of African American History and Culture, part of the Smithsonian Institution in Washington, DC.

Joani Tremblay

b. 1984, Montreal, Canada Lives and works between Montreal and Joshua Tree, CA

Joani Tremblay's paintings offer nuanced explorations of natural landscapes and their intricate relationships with human presence and utilization. Her compositions draw from a diverse array of sources, including on-site studies, digital imagery, and memories of places she has traveled. By seamlessly weaving together these disparate elements, Tremblay crafts meticulously detailed natural vistas and skyscapes, interspersed with fragments of constructed architectural environments defined by vibrant swathes of color and organic forms. Her work echoes her artistic predecessors that include some some of the early Modernist painters such as Arthur Dove and Georgia O'Keefe, as well as the early feminisct creation of Agnes Pelton and Judy Chicago.

Tremblay's work has been exhibited at venues across North America and internationally including Harper's, New York, East Hampton, and Los Angeles (2023, 2022, 2021, and 2020); Bradley Ertaskrian, Montreal (2023); Anat Ebgi, Los Angeles (2022); The Pit, Glendale, CA (2022 and 2021); Marie-Laure Fleisch Gallery, Brussels (2020); Interstate, Brooklyn (2019); Zalucky Contemporary, Toronto (2019 and 2018); and Pony Sugar, Stockholm (2017). Her work has been acquired by numerous institutions including The Mint Museum, Charlotte; Montreal Municipal Art Collection, Montreal; and RBC Corporate Collection, Toronto.
