## Honggoo Kang



Honggoo Kang (b.1956 | Shinan, Korea) Honggoo Kang, who has been working for over 30 years, began creating manipulated digital images that capture the real-life scenery of Korean society. Since the 2000s, he has used digital photography and painting to record the changing face of the city under capitalism, such as towns that have been razed by redevelopment, as well as the realities of the people who live there. Kang, who belongs to the first generation of digital photographers in Korea, has used digital image manipulation techniques such as photo collage and photo montage, as well as photographs of objects and a technique of paintings on top of photographs, to harness both the documentary quality of the photograph and the unreality of digital photography. Ultimately, these efforts have enabled him to create images that traverse the boundary between the real and the fake, using metaphor to express the complex, contradictory reality of Korean society.



# Sen Chung



Sen Chung (b.1963 | Düsseldorf, Germany) Sen Chung has been working on the essence of two-dimensional painting for a long time. His paintings are based on nostalgia and melancholic sensibility, and continue from figurative to semi-abstract and geometric abstraction. A few strands of color and lines are filled freely enough to be considered a primitive break away from the frame of shapes and emphasizes the intimacy in his work. Sen Chung paints his numerous emotions, thoughts, phenomena which he had faced while staring at the blank canvas during his meditative phase. Chung expects some kind of drama to happen beyond the canvas, while he composes emotional phenomena in the air that cannot take a definite form. Along with the empty spaces exposed as the texture of linen, on which the painting pervades, we are led to gaze at the geometric form, color tone, and small brushstrokes following the artist's unique rhythm. In the end, it creates an emotional impact.


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Sen Chung, *Untitled*, 2023. Oil on canvas 140 x 170 cm **33,000** USD

## **Dongwook Suh**



Dongwook Suh (b.1974 | Seoul, Korea) There stands one figure in Dongwook Suh's painting. If there is a constant from many changes in his painting from the first solo show until now, it is that he has always placed one person in the canvas. Therefore, his paintings are always viewed as portraits despite the continuous changes in forms, regardless of whom it be in them; an anonymous figure, someone nearby, or a fictional character in the movie. Suh has been exploring the medium of portrait painting since the mid–2000s. He has been questioning one, which is fundamental to him as a painter: "What is a painting?" In particular, Dongwook Suh moves beyond an exploration of the form of painting and, for the first time in his career, deals directly with the subject of melancholy, a theme that has run through his works over the last twenty years. Suh has stated that "the era where art was created exclusively through formal experimentation has ended," reflecting his belief that form is simply a "funnel" through which the artist accesses some fundamental essence.




Dongwook Suh, *SH*, 2020. Oil on canvas 162.2 x 130.3 cm



# Suh Yongsun




Suh Yongsun (b.1951 | Yangpyeong, Korea) Suh Yongsun has been exploring the subject of human nature since the 1980s, and over the last forty years, he has created a spirited body of work. Suh features works reflect on time living in the cities of Seoul, New York, Beijing, and Paris between 2007 and 2024. These works capture Suh's emotions while living in these cities and his wide-ranging observations of himself and the people who live there. The subjects of Suh Yongsun's urban landscapes and self-portraits are all people, and for him, exploring human nature is both the source of his artistic practice and a perpetual question about the "confirmation of his own existence." He uses "art" as a healthy way to release the draining emotions and thoughts emanating from modern society so that they do not accumulate inside of him. Indeed, he has stated that "what we need as humans, who live by letting countless thoughts flow through us every second, is art."



"Self-portraits are paintings that fail the moment you begin to draw. From the instant you draw a line, the image loses its resemblance. The image one conceives of oneself is never realized. And thus, self-portrait are one of the most tragic art forms an artist can produce. In that sense, it is like the myth of Sisyphus. You anyhow continue to draw despite repeated failures. Still, there is indeed a difference between the picture you painted before and the one you painted after. And this is what keeps you going. Moreover, there is also a feeling that something is partially and gradually being embodied."




Suh Yongsun, Soldiers 6, 2013. Acrylic on wood board 222 x 53 x 46 cm




**Suh Yongsun**, *Head 35*, 2015. Pine 65 x 36 x 21.5 cm

## Jong Oh



Jong Oh (b.1981 | Seoul, Korea) Jong Oh begins his work by first closely examining a space; then, he focuses his attention on not just the architectural features of the space but also the minute traces of how the space has been used. In this way, he communicates with space. As an artist concerned with the reverberation of sound within a space, Jong Oh has stated that he senses the low "reverberations" of any space he works in. The visitor's experience of these three–dimensional geometric works made from simple materials such as thread, wooden and steel rods, pencil lines, and chains is influenced by a variety of variables, including the visitor's gaze and movements, invisible factors such as light and gravity, as well as the interactions between the one–dimensional lines and two–dimensional planes of the various works. Through the manipulation of these elements, Jong Oh experiments with the various dimensions and perspectives of the space.

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




Jong Oh, *Line Sculpture (marble) #7*, 2024. Wood, wire, marble 47.5 x 10.5 x 10.5 cm


