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Iván Argote was born 1983 in Bogotá, Colombia. He lives and works in Paris, France.

Argote studied at the Universidad Nacional de Colombia in Bogotá, Colombia; and at l'Ecole de Beaux Arts in Paris, France. His work explores the relationship between history, politics and the construction of our own subjectivities. Argote's videos, sculptures, collages and installations in public space attempt to generate questions about how we relate to each other, to the state, to heritage and traditions. His works are critical, sometimes anti-institutional, which relate to the idea of bringing affections to politics, and politics to affections, with a strong and tender tone.

Some of his solo exhibitions are Juntos Together, ASU - Arizona State University Art Museum, Tempe (AZ) 2019; Radical Tenderness, MALBA, Buenos Aires, 2018; Somos Tiernos, Museo Universitario del Chopo, Mexico, 2017 and Sírvete de mi, sírveme de ti, Proyecto Amil, Lima, among others. He has also participated in numerous group exhibitions, biennials and film festivals such as Global Resistance, Centre Pompidou, Paris, FR, 2020; Desert X, Coachella Valley, CA, US, 2019 and Poéticas de la emoción, Caixa Forum, Barcelona; 2018 and Regreso al futuro, Casa Encendida, Madrid, 2018, among others.

Iván Argote's monumental sculpture of a pigeon "Dinosaur" was announced in 2024 as the next High Line Plinth Commission, making him the youngest artist and the first from the global south. The artist has also participated at the Biennale de Lyon in 2024 and his work is featured in the 60th International Art Exhibition of La Biennale di Venezia 2024 "Stranieri Ovunque - Foreigners Everywhere", curated by Adriano Pedrosa, with an ambitious outdoor installation in the Giardini. In 2022 he was nominated for the prestigious Prix Marcel Duchamp and presented his work in an exhibition at the Centre Pompidou that ran from October 2022 to January 2023. Argote also participated in an artist residency at the Villa Medici, Rome in 2022.

His works are part of important collections such as Guggenheim Museum, New York, US, Centre Pompidou, Paris, FR, ASU Art Museum, Phoenix, USA, CNAP (Centre National des Arts Plastiques), Paris, FR, Colección de Arte del Banco de la República, Bogotá, CO, Kadist Foundation, San Francisco, USA, Cisneros Fontanals Art Foundation, Miami, USA, MACBA, Barcelona, ES, MUNTREF, Buenos Aires, AR and Saatchi Art, London, UK among others.



Wild Flowers, Augustus, 2024

Wild Flowers, Augustus is part of a series of works in which the artist, based on sculptures of historical figures, reproduces different parts of the body in isolation (torso, pelvis, hands, fingers, toes, feet) by casting and casting in bronze. The sculptures become, by Argote's hand, pots or small gardens containing plants native to the region where they are exhibited. Plants that grow naturally in the area, including wild plants, flowers, herbs, shrubs, and other plants already present in local nurseries, but which are exotic to the sculpture they inhabit.

This work continues Iván Argote's exploration of the reappropriation of statues that commemorate the "great men" of the past, thus *Wild Flowers*, *Augustus* anticipates a future in which nature would reclaim and invade the remains of statues erected in honor of "great historical men". The artist develops narratives in which these statues are stripped of their usual symbolic power, for example, he staged the removal by the authorities of the statues of Christopher Columbus (*Paseo*, 2022) and Joseph Gallieni (*Aurevoir*, *Joseph Gallieni*, 2021).

In this particular work, Argote uses as a starting point a statue of the Roman Emperor Augustus, who, among other things, was the first emperor to move an Egyptian obelisk to Rome (*Obelisco Flaminio de Asun*). During his residency at the Villa Medici in Rome in 2022, Ivan Argote conducted extensive research and created a film about this obelisk, entitled *Levitate*, which was screened that same year at the Pompidou Center in Paris.

Voyagers serie, 2024

As a continuation of his Wild Flowers series, Iván Argote exclusively debuts *Voyagers* (2024) at Art Basel Miami Beach—a new series of paintings on concrete inspired by exotic invasive plants.

Voyagers is a series of paintings on concrete that constitute a catalog of plants that are officially blacklisted in European countries. However, most of them are quite common and are easily found in flower shops or empty fields. These species were brought to Europe for various reasons during colonial times or today, such as agriculture or ornamentation. Today, however, these plants are institutionally feared and opposed for their reproductivity or aesthetics. The categorization and rhetoric surrounding these plants parallels institutional attitudes and policies directed at migrant populations.

This series is part of Argote's installations, which combine sculptures, ruins and vegetation to highlight non-human resistance to dominant historical narratives.
